What Are Civil Liberties? – American Government (2e)

In Chapter 5 “Civil Rights”, we discuss the Fourteenth Amendment, added to the Constitution in 1868, and how its due process clause, which bars states from depriving persons of “life, liberty, or property, without due process of law,” is the basis of civil rights. The Fourteenth Amendment is crucial to civil liberties, too.

4.1 The Bill of Rights – American Government and Politics ...

The Constitution that emerged from the Philadelphia convention in 1787 did not seriously address civil liberties. During debates over ratification, the Antifederalists argued that, by failing to provide explicit protections for individual citizens, the new Constitution invited tyranny. Bowing to political pressure, James Madison agreed to introduce a bill of rights during the first Congress.
