Teaching Critical Thinking Skills: Literature Review
Critical thinking can be set apart from problem solving (Hedges, 1991) in that problem solving is a linear process of evaluation, while critical thinking is a comprehensive set of abilities allowing the inquirer to properly facilitate each stage of the linear problem-solving process.

Literature Review: The purpose of the literature review is to give details of other, relevant, published or unpublished research (books, other journal articles, reports, theses etc) and relate it specifically to the research question. The review should critically examine the major theories related to the topic and demonstrates the author's understanding of the topic and provides evidence to show that there are gaps in the research that the particular article or book chapter will attempt to fill.
