1683-1983. Immigration. German immigration began in the 17th century and continued into the late 19th century at a rate exceeding that of any other country. Working with William Penn, Franz Daniel Pastorius established "Germantown" near Philadelphia in 1683.

In 1850 there were already 20,000 German-born Baltimoreans; by 1890 this number had doubled. As in other American cities, German immigration to Baltimore declined at the turn of the century and after the two World Wars the Germans in Baltimore did not regain sufficient strength to leave a distinct mark on the city.
