Nevertheless, available data indicate that Americans who are white, insured, college-educated, and upper income have poorer health than their counterparts in other industrialized countries. 1 There appears to be something uniquely American about spending more on health care and getting less health. The American health care paradox—the existence of high spending on health care and poor

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health—can be resolved when we step back to consider what it is that produces a healthy population.
