The Bayeux Tapestry is not a tapestry at all, but rather an embroidery. A tapestry is something that's woven on a loom, whereas an embroidery is thread stitched onto a cloth background.

Despite its name, the Bayeux Tapestry is in fact a narrative embroidery, about 68.3 metres (approx 224 feet) long and about 70cm (approx 20 inches) wide, of which 50cm (approx 13 inches) are devoted to the embroidery itself. The embroidery consists of pictures and text inscriptions, and comprises nine panels of linen cloth joined together.

Material & Dimensions The Bayeux Tapestry is an embroidered piece of multiple-banded linen fastened onto a backing cloth. It measures 68.38 metres (224 ft) in length and is 50 cm (20 inches) wide. The thread used to stitch the designs is mostly two-ply wool yarn with some use of linen thread.
