# No Fear Literature: The Canterbury Tales: Prologue to the ...

The pilgrims never reach Canterbury, the return journey is not described, and not all the pilgrims who appear in the poem's prologue end up telling a tale. The Prologue describes a ploughman among the company, for example, whose tale is nowhere to be found. Whereas Chaucer 's original plan presumably envisaged over 100 stories, only 24 survive.
