Understanding Pattern Markings - The Sewing Loft
Notch Symbols, or markings used on a pattern to indicate cutting lines, joining points, hems, dart legs, etc.

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IMPORTANT: Single notches always refer to the front of a pattern and a double notch always refers to the back of a pattern. A pattern notcher is an ideal tool for the job. However, a single line or triangle will do the job.
