Owen chooses words to suit the subject matter in Mental Cases. The diction of the poem is chilling and purposefully repellent. He spares us no detail of the physical symptoms the shell shocked men exhibit: they sit and rock 1.1-2, their teeth bared 1.4, with tongues hanging out whilst their 'jaws...slob their relish' 1.3, their hands absently 'plucking' and 'snatching' 1.25,27.

Owen elucidates that people did not readily accept the effects of the war at that timebecause damage was less shameful compared to bodily wounds.

Analysis of a Poem by Wilfred Owen, Mental Cases essay ...

Owen reflects on the destruction of the mind by using a structure with abnormalities in rhythm and form. There is no rhyme scheme to "Mental Cases;" this fits with the gravity of his other work to stress the dull, prolonged pain of the soldiers' suffering. Many lines, such as the first, have trochee pentameter.

'Mental Cases', on the other hand, captures the damage to men's minds as a result of war. Owen's aim is to shock and to describe in stark detail the ghastly physical symptoms of mental torment. The main consequence that is explored in 'Disabled' is what the horrors of war can do to a person's physical state.

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
